

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About the Cover: The seal of Martin Luther

"First, there is a black cross in a heart that remains its natural color [red]. This is to remind me that it is faith in the Crucified One that saves us. Anyone who believes from the heart will be justified (Romans 10:10). It is a black cross, which mortifies and causes pain, but it leaves the heart its natural color. It doesn't destroy nature, that is to say, it does not kill us but keeps us alive, for the just shall live by faith in the Crucified One (Romans 1:17).

The heart should stand in the middle of a white rose. This is to show that faith gives joy, comfort, and peace—it puts the believer into a white, joyous rose. Faith does not give peace and joy like the world gives (John 14:27). This is why the rose must be white, not red. White is the color of the spirits and angels (cf. Matthew 28:3; John 20:12).

This rose should stand in a sky-blue field, symbolizing that a joyful spirit and faith is a beginning of heavenly, future joy, which begins now, but is grasped in hope, not yet fully revealed.

Around the field of blue is a golden ring to symbolize that blessedness in heaven lasts forever and has no end. Heavenly blessedness is exquisite, beyond all joy and better than any possessions, just as gold is the most valuable and precious metal."

"When our Lord and Master Jesus Christ said, 'Repent,' he willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance."

The First of Dr. Martin Luther's 95 Theses, which he nailed to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg on October 31, 1517, thus sparking the Reformation.

¹⁹Now we know that whatever the law says it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. ²⁰For by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin.

²¹But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it—²²the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: ²³for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, ²⁴and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, ²⁵whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins. ²⁶It was to show his righteousness at the present time, so that he might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.

²⁷Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law? By a law of works? No, but by the law of faith. ²⁸For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law.

REFORMATION REFLECTION

It was the book of Romans, and this passage in particular, that caused Luther's breakthrough in understanding the Gospel as a pure gift of God's righteousness to us on account of Christ, and not our own works. He wrote, "This passage from Paul became to me the very gate of Paradise."

About Today's Music

As you might expect on this day of commemorating the Reformation, many of today's hymns come to us from the Reformer himself, a man especially gifted by God in his time to proclaim the truth of God's Word in word and song. Our **Processional Hymn**, A Mighty Fortress Is Our God, is Dr. Luther's best-known hymn, an iconic paraphrase of Psalm 46. The tune of A Mighty Fortress ("Ein Feste Burg") also serves as the basis for the chant tones heard in today's **Gradual**; see if you can make it out.



The **Hymn of the Day** for Reformation

Sunday, Salvation unto Us Has Come, was penned by Luther's contemporary and fellow reformer Paul Speratus and included in the very first Lutheran Hymnal, the so-called Achtliederbuch ["Eight-Hymn Book"] of 1524.

During the **Distribution** of the Lord's Supper, we will sing the *This Is the Feast*, whose text comes from Revelation 5 and 19. While it appears as a hymn of praise in Setting 1 of the Divine Service, it is really more fitting as a Communion hymn. Next, *Built on the Rock* is hymn written by the Swedish Lutheran pastor Nicolai Grundtvig. Then we will sing with the choir a setting (arr. Jeremy Bankson, ©2017) of Luther's *Lord, Keep Us Steadfast in Thy Word*, originally intended as "a children's hymn, to be sung against the two arch-enemies of Christ and His holy Church, the Pope and the Turk [i.e., the works-righteousness teachings of the Pope and the hostile forces of the Ottoman Empire]." The final two **Distribution Hymns** are *If God Had Not Been on Our Side*, Luther's hymn paraphrase of Psalm 124 (and our October Hymn of the Month), and *O Lord, We Praise Thee*, a 15th-century post-Communion hymn to which Luther added stanzas 2 and 3.

Finally, our Closing Hymn, offered today in a festive setting for multiple instruments by John Behnke (©1969), is the well-known hymn by the LCMS theologian and professor Martin Franzmann (1907–76): *Thy Strong Word*. The hymn serves both as a reminder of the power of God's holy Word, which "bespeaks us righteous" (st. 3) and as a rousing doxology to our almighty and all-merciful triune God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Reformation ~ The Son of God Has Set Us Free from Sin and Death by His Grace

"Wisdom is justified by her deeds" (Matt. 11:19), and the true Wisdom of God, Christ Jesus the incarnate Son, justifies us by His deeds. He prepares His way by the preaching of repentance, but He has suffered the violence of the Law and voluntarily handed Himself over to violent men, that we might eat and drink with Him in His Kingdom and "remain in the house forever" (John 8:35). For He is "a friend of tax collectors and sinners" (Matt. 11:19), and He has rescued us by His grace from the slavery of sin and death. By the proclamation of His eternal Gospel "to those who dwell on earth, to every nation and tribe and language and people" (Rev. 14:6), "the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law" (Rom. 3:21), "that He might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus" (Rom. 3:26). And by hearing the Gospel of Christ Jesus, "whom God put forward as a propitiation by His blood, to be received by faith" (Rom. 3:25), "you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free" (John 8:31–32).

What is a "Gospel Procession"?

You may sometimes see the Gospel reading take place in a different part of the church. On special Sundays, the Bible is carried into the center of the congregation where the pastor reads the Gospel to the people. There may also be some festive music or singing. After the reading, while the Bible is being carried back to its place, there may be more music and singing. This ceremony is called the Gospel Procession.

Why do we have a Gospel Procession?

Jesus is the living Word. He set us free from the burden of sin through His life, death and resurrection. A Gospel

Procession reminds us that this wonderful news is to be carried into the whole world. Jesus came for all people and He offers eternal life to all who believe by the power of the Holy Spirit! Wow! A Gospel Procession is a wonderful thing!





Parents: Before or after the Divine Service, remind your children of the meaning of the Gospel Procession. When it is taking place, point out the reverent way the pastor, crucifer, and/or assistants move. Reverence and humility are shown to the One who is truly among us declaring the Good News of forgiveness of sins by His Word! Read John 1:1–3, 14 and discuss it with your children. How is Jesus described in this reading?
